Behavior	Management	Definition	Examples
Affection Inappropriate Display	Teacher Managed	Lower-intensity inappropriate, but consensual verbal and/or physical gestures/contact of a romantic or sexual nature.	Examples: Hugging, kissing, hand holding groping
Affection Inappropriate Display	Office	Higher-intensity inappropriate, but consensual verbal and/or physical gestures/contact of a romantic or sexual nature.	Examples: Clothing removal, "making out, sexual contact
Alcohol Use/ Possession of	Office (SESIR)	SESIR Definition: Possession, sale, purchase, or use of alcoholic beverages. "Use" means the person is caught in the act of using, admits to use or is discovered to have used in the course of an investigation.	SESIR
Arson	Office (SESIR)	SESIR Definition: Intentionally setting a fire on school property. To damage or cause to be damaged, by fire or explosion, any dwelling, structure or conveyance, whether occupied or not, or its contents.	SESIR
Battery (Aggravated/ Felony)	Office (SESIR)	SESIR Definition: Physical attack/harm; The physical use of force or violence by an individual against another. The attack must be serious enough to warrant reporting to law enforcement and result in more serious bodily injury. To distinguish from Fighting, report an incident as Battery only when the force or violence is carried out against a person who is not fighting back.	SESIR
Bomb Threat/False Alarm	Office (SESIR)	See SESIR Definition included under "Disruption on Campus - Major".	SESIR
Breaking and Entering/ Burglary	Office (SESIR)	SESIR Definition: Illegal entry into a facility. Unlawful entry with force or unauthorized presence in a building or other structure or conveyance with evidence of the intent to damage or remove property or harm a person(s).	SESIR
Bullying	Office (SESIR)	SESIR Definition: (intimidating behaviors) Systematically and chronically inflicting physical hurt or psychological distress on one or more students or employees that is severe or pervasive enough to create an intimidating, hostile, or offensive environment; or unreasonably interfere with the individual's school performance or participation.	SESIR

- Pg. 20 STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT LEVEL I DISRUPTIVE BEHAVIORS
- **Level I Behaviors** are acts that disrupt the orderly operation of the classroom, school function, and extracurricular activities or approved transportation. (alphabetized behaviors)
- Cheating /Plagiarism moved from Level II
- Confrontation with another student / Physical contact /(minor) physical aggression
- Defiance / Disrespect / Non-compliance / Insubordination
- Disruptive behavior (including behavior on the school bus)
- Inappropriate display of affection
- Inappropriate language (general, not directed at someone)
- Inappropriate location / Out of bounds area
- Patterns of non-attendance Skip class/ Tardy added
- Possession/ display of inappropriate items or materials*
- Prohibited sales on school grounds (other than controlled substance) added
- Minor Bus Infraction added
- Tardy & Dress code removed
- Teasing/Taunt moved from Level II
- Technology Violation
- *See Sexual Offenses (other), Level IV, for obscene or lewd materials.
- Administrators must contact law enforcement for any criminal conduct. If the victim of a crime requests a police report, the principal of designee must report the incident to law enforcement.



Pg. 21 RANGE OF CORRECTIVE STRATEGIES

The principal or designee must select at least one of the following strategies from PLAN I. Principals may authorize use of PLAN II for repeated, serious or habitual LEVEL I infractions. (alphabetized strategies)

PLANI

- Alternative to suspension**
- Behavior Plan
- Confiscation of electronic/communication devices
- Detention or other Board approved in-school program
- In school suspension
- Loss of privileges
- Parent/Guardian contact**
- Participation in an informal counseling session related to the infraction
- Peer mediation
- Replacement or payment for any damaged property (if appropriate)
- Reprimand
- Restorative Practices added
- Revocation of the right to participate in social and/or extracurricular activities
- Saturday School
- Student contract
- Student, parents/guardians/staff conference
- Temporary assignment from class where the infraction occurred
- Temporary loss of bus privileges (if appropriate)

**Good faith attempt must be made immediately to contact parent/guardian by telephone.



Pg. 21 LEVEL II SERIOUSLY DISRUPTIVE BEHAVIORS

Level II Behaviors are more serious than Level I because they significantly interfere with learning and/or the well-being of others. (alphabetized behaviors)

- Pattern or intensity of any level 1 behavior
- Bullying Moved from Level III
- Cheating/ Plagiarism Moved to Level 1
- Confrontation with another student /Physical contact/minor physical aggression Moved to Level 1
- Defiance / Disrespect / Non-compliance / Insubordination Moved to Level 1
- Confrontation with a staff member added
- Distribution of items or materials that are inappropriate for an educational setting *
- Failure to comply with previously prescribed corrective strategies
- Fighting (minor) / Physical Aggression
- Harassment Moved from Level III.
- Tease / Taunt Moved to Level 1
- Inappropriate language / Abusive language / Profanity
- Leaving school grounds without permission / Elopement
- Prohibited sales on school grounds (other than controlled substances)
- Possession and/or use of tobacco products**
- Property destruction / Vandalism (under \$1,000)
- Tobacco Use or Possession Moved from Level III.
- Transient threat against an individual on school grounds added

*See Sexual Offenses (Other), Level IV, for obscene or lewd materials.

Administrators must contact law enforcement for any criminal conduct. If the victim of a crime requests a police report, the principal or designee must report the incident to law enforcement.



Pg. 22 - RANGE OF CORRECTIVE STRATEGIES

The principal or designee must select at least one of the following strategies from PLAN II. The use or appropriate strategies from a previous PLAN may be used in conjunction with the PLAN. Principals may authorize the use of PLAN III for repeated, serious or habitual Level II infractions.

PLAN II

- Alternative to suspension**
- In School Suspension added
- Loss of privileges
- Parent/guardian contact**
- Restorative Practices/School-based Programs added
- School-based program that focuses on modifying the student's inappropriate behavior or promotes positive behavior - removed
- Suspension from school for one to five days***
- Saturday School
- **Good faith attempt must be made immediately to contact the parent/guardian by telephone.
- ***Send written notice to parent/guardian within 24 hours via U.S. mail. A manifestation hearing must take place for any exceptional education student nearing 10 days for suspension from school.



Pg. 22 LEVEL III OFFENSIVE/HARMFUL BEHAVIORS

Level III Behaviors are more serious than Level II because they endanger health and safety, damage property, and/or cause serious disruptions to the learning environment.

- Pattern or intensity of any Level I or II Behavior
- Battery added
- Breaking and Entering/Burglary Moved to Level IV
- Bullying (repeated harassment) Moved to Level II
- Disruption on campus/Disorderly conduct
- False Fire Alarm/Bomb threat
- Fighting (serious)
- Harassment Moved to Level II
- Hazing
- Larceny /Theft (under \$750.00) added
- Other Major Offenses added
- Possession of simulated weapons
- Possession or use of a controlled substances* moved alcohol to Level II
- Sexual harassment
- Substantive threat against an individual on school grounds added
- Trespassing
- Vandalism (\$1,000 or more)

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
Administrators may contact law enforcement.

The principal or designee must select at least one of the following strategies from PLAN III. The use of appropriate strategies from previous PLANs may also be used in conjunction with this PLAN. Principals may authorized here of PLAN IV for repeated, serious or habitual Level III infractions.



Pg. 23 - PLAN III

- Alternative to suspension**
- Complete threat assessment and action plan added
- Parent/guardian contact**
- Permanent removal from class (placement review committee decision may be required)
- Referral to alternative educational setting
- Recommendation for expulsion
- Restorative Practices/School-based program added
- Suspension from school for one to ten days***
- **Good faith attempt must be made immediately to contact parent/guardian by telephone.
- ***Send written notice to parent/guardian within 24 hours via U.S. mail. A manifestation hearing must take place for any exceptional education student nearing 10 days for suspension from school.



Pg. 23 - LEVEL IV DANGEROUS OR VIOLENT BEHAVIORS

Level IV Behaviors are more serious acts of unacceptable behavior than Level III. They seriously endanger the health and well-being of others and/or damage property.

- Pattern or intensity of any level I, II, or III behavior
- Battery against a school staff
- Breaking and Entering/Burglary added
- Hate crime
- Other major crimes/incidents
- Physical Attack added
- Robbery added
- Sale and/or distribution of alcohol and/or controlled substances
- Sex offenses (other) (including possession and/or distribution and/or distribution of obscene or lewd materials)
- Sexual Assault added
- Use/possession of weapon
 Administrators must contact law enforcement.



Pg. 24 - RANGE OF CORRECTIVE STRATEGIES

The principal or designee must use any of the following strategies from PLAN IV. The use of appropriate strategies from previous PLANs may also be used in conjunction with this PLAN.

PLAN IV

- Complete threat assessment and action plan added
- Parent/guardian contact**
- Recommendation for expulsion
- Referral to alternative educational setting
- Restorative Practices/School-based program added
- Suspension from school for one to ten days***

**Good faith attempt must be made immediately to contact parent/guardian by telephone.

***Send written notice to parent/guardian within 24 hours via U.S. mail. A manifestation hearing must take place for any exceptional education student nearing 10 days for suspension from school.



Pg. 24 - LEVEL V MOST SERIOUS, DANGEROUS OR VIOLENT BEHAVIORS

Level V Behaviors are the most serious acts of misconduct and violent actions that threaten life.

- Pattern or intensity of any behavior
- Aggravated Battery
- Armed robbery
- Arson
- Assault / Threat against employees or persons conducting official business* Removed
- Homicide
- Kidnapping/Abduction
- Making a false report/threat against the school* Removed
- Possession, use, sale or distribution of firearms, explosives, destructive devices and other weapons*
- Sexual Battery

Administrators **must** contact law enforcement. The possession of firearms or other weapons on school property may result in criminal penalties in addition to expulsion. *One year expulsion recommended.



Pg. 24 - RANGE OF CORRECTIVE STRATEGIES

The principal or designee <u>must</u> use the following strategies from PLAN V. The use of appropriate strategies from previous PLANs may also be used in Conjunction with this PLAN.

PLAN V

- Complete threat assessment and action plan
- Parent/guardian contact**
- Recommendation for expulsion
- Referral to alternative educational setting
- Suspension from school for one to ten days***
- **Good faith attempt must be made immediately to contact parent/guardian by telephone.
- ***Send written notice to parent/guardian within 24 hours via U.S. mail. A manifestation hearing must take place for any exceptional education student nearing 10 days for suspension from school.

This level of infraction may result in an expulsion requiring School Board action.
